Opportunities to Help!

Thanks to all those who donated items, kits, and money for the Kits for Conference project. A total of 229 kits were sent to conference, exceeding last year's total of 220 kits. The total included 147 health kits, 68 school kits, and 14 layettes. A total of \$140 was received in monetary donations. A special thanks also to Mary Church, Flo McFarland, and Sally Pappas for sewing Velcro on the school bags. We couldn't have done it without you! A super effort all around.

A Medical Mission Project –“A Medicine Box”

What is a Medicine Box? It consists of 18 essential items needed by a hospital or clinic to treat the basic needs of its patients. It has two parts:

- * Products donated by a congregation or other groups, and
- * Products obtained by Interchurch Medical Assistance (IMA)

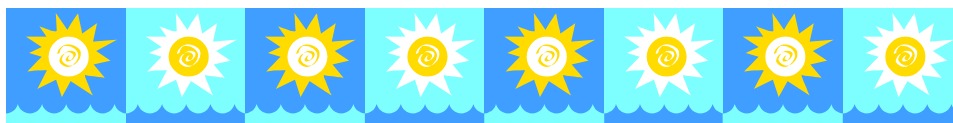
Churches contribute part of the essential items in the form of a Kit of over-the-counter products and supplies. IMA will provide the other pharmaceuticals needed to complete the

Medicine Box by using funds contributed by the churches.

One medicine box will enable a hospital or clinic to treat common illnesses in a population of approximately 1,000 adults and children for a three month period, or to respond to a special medical emergency, such as a tsunami. The over-the-counter-items include gauze pads, adhesive tape, antibiotic ointment, aspirin, iron tablets, multivitamins for adults and children, and children's chewable Tylenol tablets. Expiration date needs to be at least

12/06/ IMA provides the antibacterials, antifungals and other prescription medicines and products. The cost to each congregation for these items is \$375 for each kit.

We are asking St. Luke's for support in this project so that these items can be made available to those so greatly in need of medical care. Look for further information on this project in the bulletin and handouts.

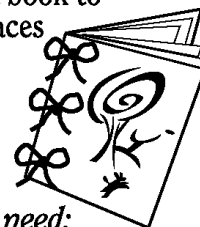

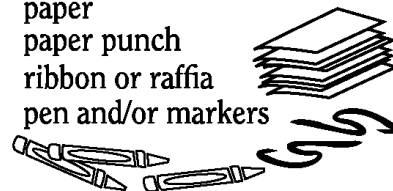
MAKE A "SUMMER ADVENTURE" JOURNAL

If you take a vacation trip this summer, make a book to record all the places you visit or the places you'd like to visit someday.



Here's what you need:

- 5-10 sheets of white paper
- 1 sheet of heavy construction paper
- paper punch
- ribbon or raffia
- pen and/or markers



Here's how to make your journal:

1. Fold the construction paper in half. This will be the cover.
2. Stack the white paper, fold it in half and place it inside the cover. Trim the edges if they stick out.
3. Use the paper punch to punch 2 or 3 holes through all the paper (including the cover) near the folded edge. (You may be able to punch only a few sheets of paper at a time. In that case, use a pen to mark where the holes should be, so they will all line up.)
4. Pull the ribbon or raffia through the holes to hold the pages together, and then tie a bow.
5. Decorate the cover.
6. Fill in the pages with notes, pictures and memories about your trip.

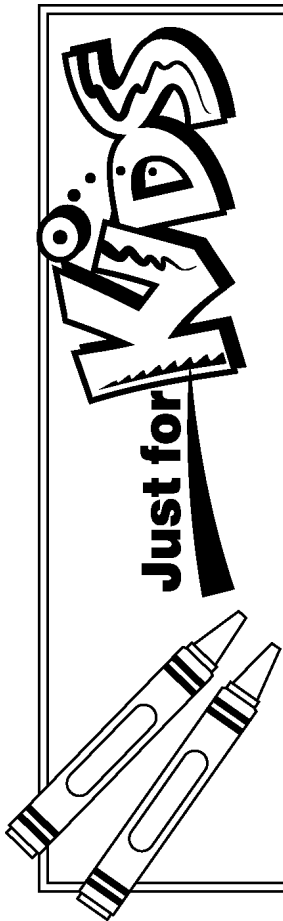

Pastor Bill's Back Page

I'm just back from the latest session of the Virginia Annual Conference down at the Hampton Coliseum. This was the 223rd edition of this gathering of United Methodists in Virginia. As always, there was a lot on the agenda. As always, too, a lot of what happened was not on the agenda. If you'll indulge me, I would like to share with you some of my impressions about our conference.

First, this was Bishop Kammerer's first Virginia Annual Conference. It didn't take a prophet to predict that questions and comparisons would arise about her ability to conduct a meeting of the largest annual conference in the world. I am happy to report, however, that she proved herself to be compassionate, wise, fair, and skillful. She is obviously a fellow disciple with deep faith in God and a great love for people. She wants to help the United Methodist Church to make disciples of Jesus Christ and change the world as we share the gospel in our deeds and our words.

Next, annual conference is always a time for fellowship. Drawing on John Wesley's insights, we United Methodists take very seriously the idea that Christian conferencing is a means of divine grace. And how! Conversations between friends and acquaintances occur all over the place. Simply meander through the display spaces around the main hall. Or browse through the Cokesbury store. Just open your eyes and your ears. You'll see and hear it

happening! Old friendships are renewed. New friendships are made. The ties that bind us together in Christ are firmly cemented. These moments are hardly ever on the agenda formally, but they always occur. And it is an absolute delight when they do!

Annual Conference is also the occasion for vital Christian worship. As many of you know, I was privileged to witness this fact from a unique perspective this year. Shortly after last year's conference, I was asked to co-lead the annual conference worship planning team. Fellow pastor, Beth Givens, and I have experienced the excitement and anxiety of planning worship for several thousand sisters and brothers. And all in a space that usually features everything from circuses to monster trucks! (Something tells me that the architects didn't seriously anticipate that the coliseum would host occasions of Christian worship.) Still, it really is something to witness the transformation of this cavernous space into a meeting place for Christ's church. And it is absolutely amazing to witness thousands of fellow believers receive Holy Communion or praise God in song and prayer. It is always inspiring to hear stellar preaching and teaching. There is nothing quite like it anywhere else.

Finally, Annual Conference is a grand time to

celebrate our mission in Christ. Did you know that we United Methodists in Virginia have given more than \$1.6 million for Southern Asia tsunami relief and recovery? We lead the entire denomination in doing this! This year, Virginia also set a goal of \$300,000 for the Annual Conference Offering to support ministries in Russia, Mozambique, Brazil, and here in Virginia. As I write this, \$245,000 has already been received. Just \$55,000 to go! Besides money, there are also hands-on efforts that include Volunteer in Mission, Appalachia Service Project, and Mountain TOP teams. We even consider and adopt policies and resolutions in our advocacy and action on behalf of the world's poor and vulnerable people. Just ask anybody. It is a truly joyful and humbling thing to realize what God is doing with us and through us here and around the world.

I have no doubt that Christ is blessing the ministries of Virginia United Methodists as a part of the church universal. The Holy Spirit is active within us and among us. I give thanks that God is still at work to re-claim and re-create our world to be a place of fellowship, worship, service, and delight.

Annual Conference Update

Addressing the theme, "We Are One in Christ," the 223rd Session of the Virginia Annual Conference met June 12-15 at the Hampton Coliseum with Bishop Charlene P. Kammerer presiding. Conference preachers included Bishop Peter Weaver, bishop of the New England Conference and president of the Council of Bishops; the Rev. Dr. Ted Smith, senior pastor of Saint Stephen's UMC in Burke, Va.; and Bishop Kammerer. Dr. Jan Love, chief executive of the Women's Division of the General Board of Global Ministries, led the morning Bible studies. Ron Hardman, conference lay leader, delivered the laity address.

Highlights of the session included 1) celebrating a mission partnership between the Virginia Conference and churches in Africa, Russia and Brazil; 2) viewing a media presentation of the ministries of the Virginia Conference Council on Ministries; 3) holding a *Service in Celebration of the Resurrection* in memory of clergy, clergy spouses, and lay members of the conference who had

died since the 2004 conference;

4) participating in the *Service for the Ordering of Ministry*, where 16 persons were ordained as elders; 26 persons were elected to probationary membership, including Charles Tran, who is the first Vietnamese probationary member in the Virginia Conference; and 42 individuals were licensed as local pastors. Among those ordained as elder was Kathleene B. Card, wife of Andrew H. Card Jr., chief of staff to President George W. Bush. 5) hearing the Rev. Tony Layman honor retirees who collectively served a total of 1,040 years in ministry; 6) collecting over \$245,000 for the conference offering to be divided among four causes (support of the Brazilian Methodist Church in its ministry with street children, construction of a women's training center and girls' dormitory in Mozambique, training for seminary students at Russia United Methodist Theological Seminary in Moscow, and funds for ministries with at-risk children in Virginia; 7) celebrating the "Holy Rollers" lay and clergy bicycle team that raised \$11,401 in pledges for

the conference offering by riding 220 miles to annual conference; 8) presenting the *Harry Denman Award* to Patty Morrell, lay, and the Rev. Tom Berlin, pastor of Floris UMC (Herndon, Va.), a congregation that received over 150 people into membership three years in a row; 9) greeting 25 persons who responded to hearing a call to explore ministry given by Bishop Kammerer following the *Service for the Ordering of Ministry*; 10) holding a closing Eucharist and Fixing of Appointments celebration; 11) collecting 34,424 health kits, 15,739 school kits, 1,166 Layettes, 76 "Heart-to-Heart Kids Kits," 22 flood buckets, 29 sewing kits and \$6,500 cash gifts for mission; 12) bagging 36,000 pounds of potatoes at the Society of Saint Andrew and Board of Global Ministries sponsored "potato drop"; 13) receiving an offering of \$3,325 for the Youth Service Fund; and 14) collecting 42 units of blood.

Membership stands at 341,773 down 333 from the previous year. Worship attendance stands at 123,901, down 951.

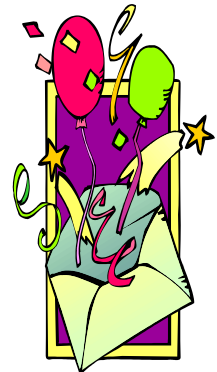
Share Your Talents
