St. Luke's to Prayer Partner with St. Rock

St. Rock UMC, a small church in Waveland, MS, was totally demolished and removed from the area by Hurricane Katrina. Located on the Mississippi/Louisiana border near New Orleans, the town was destroyed, and the majority of the homes were washed away. Only foundation slabs, a few damaged homes, and numerous FEMA trailers remain. Less than half of the residents have returned to rebuild. Some of the businesses are trying to reopen, but still need repairs.

St. Rock has applied to their conference to rebuild the church in the community rather than move north across the Interstate Highway 10. They presently have a tent erected on the old slab where the church used to be. Several of their members walk to church due to lack of transportation another reason to rebuild rather than move.

We had an opportunity to worship at St. Rock on August 27th, 2006. They had 22 present that day with three who had just returned to the area one year after the storm. They had a membership of 45 before the storm and pray that they can once again be God's church in the community.

The author relates spirituality, worship, evangelism, service and discipleship in a holistic way. Seven practices explored are "radical attachment, stubborn loyalty, tenacious serenity, habitual humility, resolute nonviolence, concrete service, and authentic witness.

Service Ministry is collecting donations during October for the I.M.A. Medicine Box. In 2005, Interchurch Medical Assistance, a project of UMCOR, distributed 1351 Medicine Boxes valued at \$3,608,909 to 48 countries worldwide. A Medicine Box provides over-the-counter medical products and prescription drugs to treat approximately 1,000 adults and children for 2-3 months. Our goal is \$500. Now that school has begun, I have started to feel "at home." Moving is such an unsettling time, from packing up everything you own and moving it across the state, to saying good-bye and leaving friends behind, to starting in a new church and trying to learn all the names, and how "everything works" here at St. Luke's. But with the arrival of the new school year, my family has settled into a routine (albeit one that starts a LOT earlier for my oldest son!).

The first three months here felt like Clara and I were playing "pin the tail on the donkey." You know that old children's party game where you are blindfolded spun around and then you feel your way through the darkness with one hand, and with the other you hope to get it right? Committee. James Pace will be the primary pastoral overseer of Education. Our other staff members will of course be the primary staff contact for certain areas (Meg Zahn with Communications for example), we just want the congregation to know the areas that the pastors oversee.

We have also finalized the preaching schedule. Clara will preach on the third Sunday of every month, and on the first Sunday every other month (odd numbered months). Beginning the first of September, both pastors will not be at every worship service. The pastor that is not preaching will be freed up to participate in other activities of the church. For example, by having Clara preach on the third Sunday each month, I am able to attend the United Methodist Men's Breakfast. We both will "float" through the Sunday School during the 9:45 hour, so we can get to know each class, sometimes as a participant, sometimes as an observer, sometimes as a teacher.

Beginning in 2007, we hope to bring back the church fellowship dinners (Wednesday Night Supper). We hope to have a 4-6 week meal/study every quarter. We are trying to schedule these programs so as to displace the least number of persons. (So it may or may not be on Wednesday's). Starting the second week of January, I will be hosting a six week course on "Shalom, Salaam, Peace." This is "peace" in the language of the three sons of Abraham – Judaism, Islam and Christianity. The first four weeks will be a study based on the book of the same title. On the fifth week I will have a Muslim Imam (Arabic word for "leader"); a Jewish Rabbi and me host a round table discussion called "Ask Us Anything." We will field questions from the participants, and answer them from our faith backgrounds. The course will conclude the sixth week as we invite members from these men's congregations to join us for a meal, and the three sons of Abraham will sit down at table and break bread together. The focus of that final session will be "How can we take this peace sharing into the larger world."
